JULIE MOORE

When Professor Julie Moore was a young girl, she founded her first library after alphabetizing her books and making her brother and sister check them out. She loved playing school — she always knew she wanted to be a teacher. Raised in Moorestown, New Jersey, Professor Moore moved to Cedarville to attend college, graduating in 1987 with a Bachelor's degree in English Education. She was active throughout her undergraduate years, balancing ministry involvement, student teaching, and acting as Communications chairperson for SGA. When she was a senior, Professor Moore became the first female Vice President of SGA, paving the way for a long and proud legacy of female leadership on campus. After graduating, she earned her Master's in English at the University of Dayton, going on to teach at UD, Wilberforce, and Cedarville. Eventually, Professor Moore became the inaugural director of Cedarville's Writing Center, a position she still holds to this day. Described by her two kids, Ashley '14 and Alex, Professor Moore is a strong, intelligent, hilarious, and deeply loving woman. Perhaps her daughter Ashley puts it best: "I don't think there is anything she can't do, and I do believe that if God plays favorites, she tops His list. She undoubtedly tops mine."

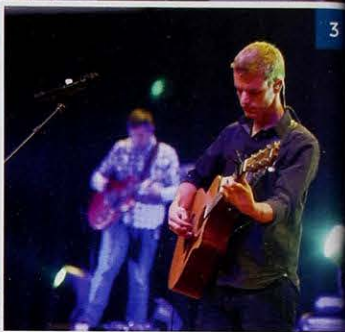

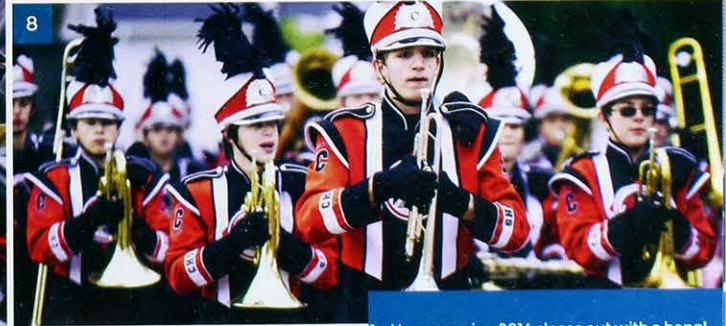
WE ARE JACKETS

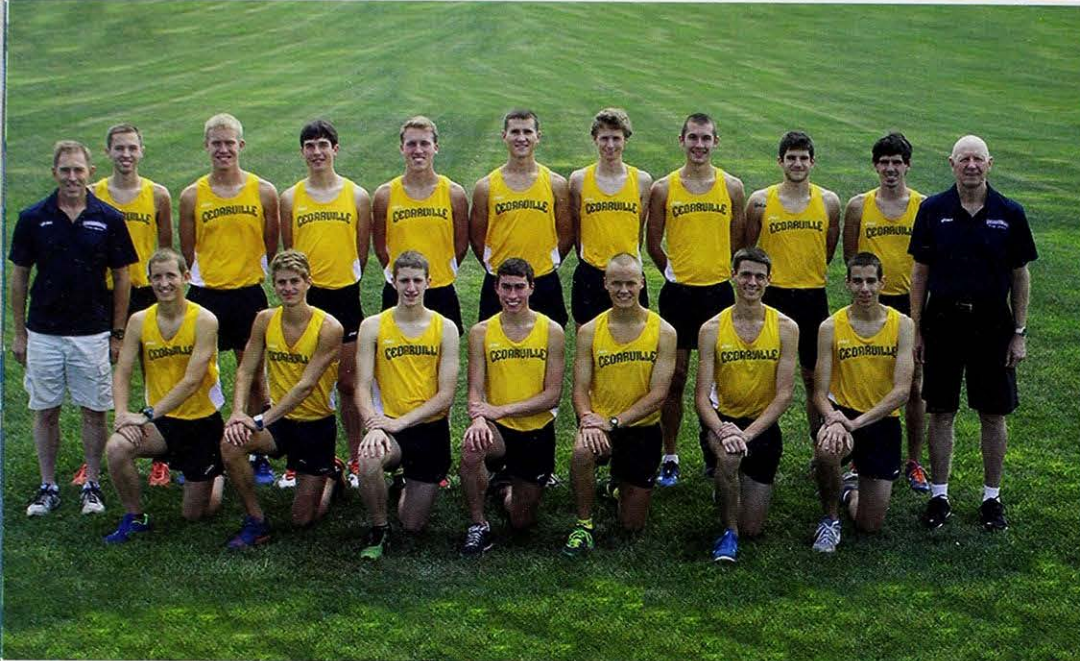

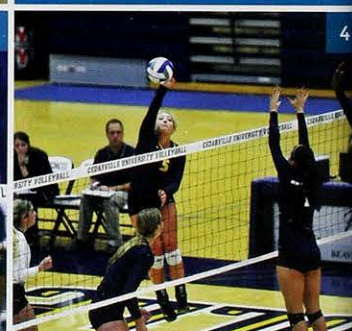

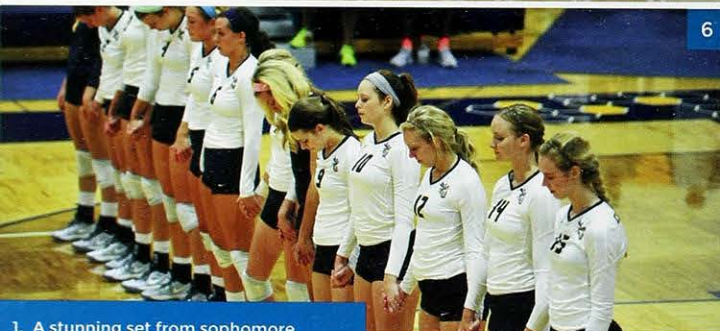

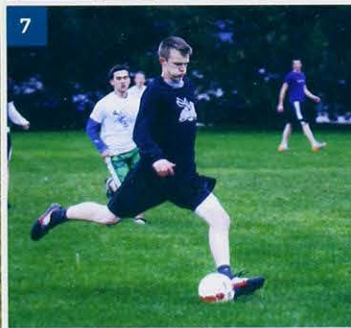

SHARING GIFTS AND THE GOSPEL

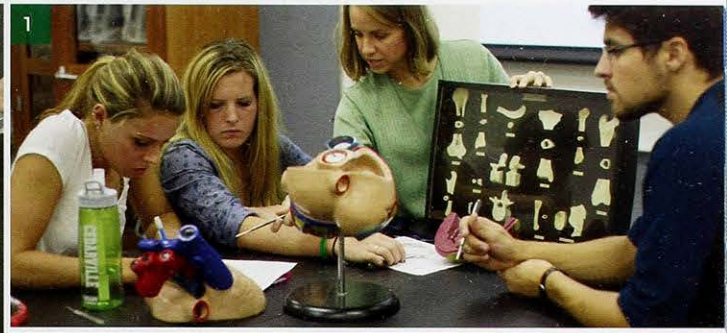

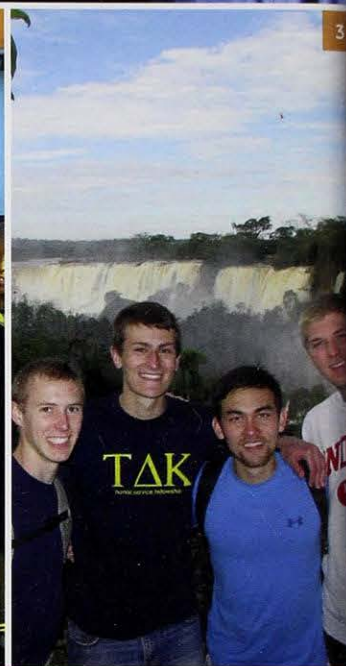

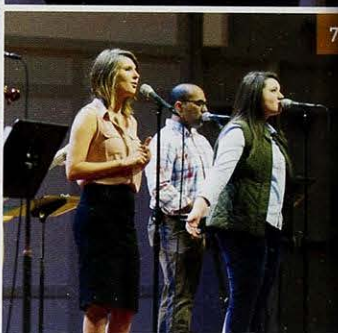

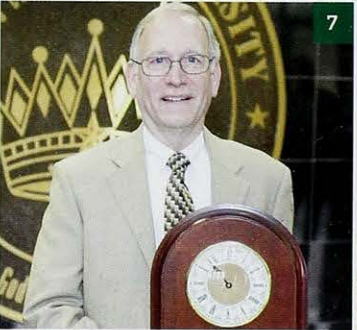

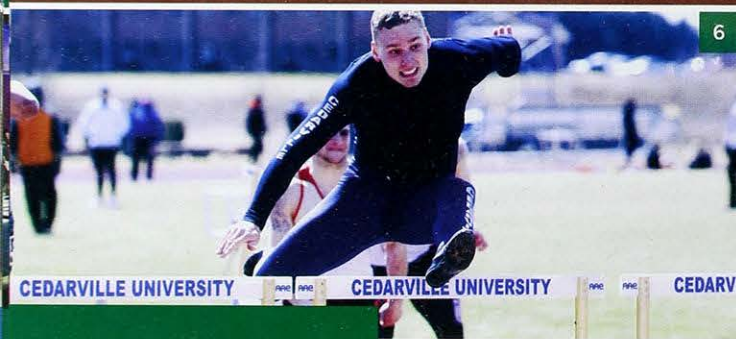

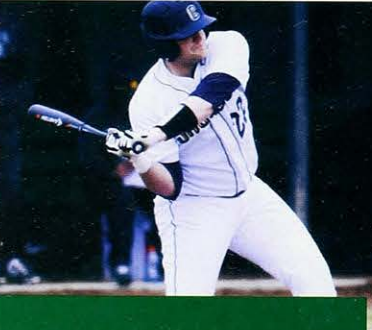

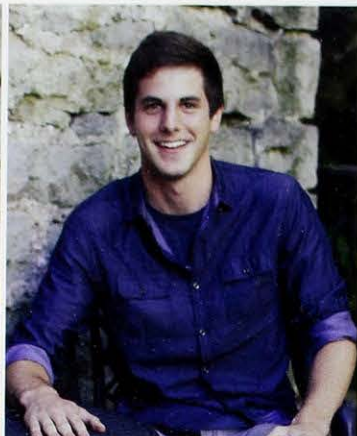

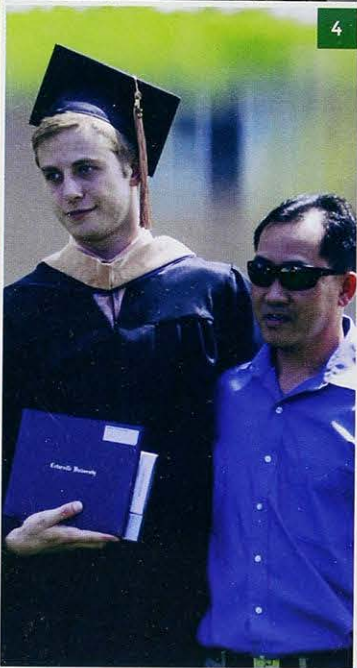
